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Throughout the students' written excerpts, you'll see the success the 96th National FFA Convention and Expo brought to our chapter last November. Our very own graduate, Derek Repp, was recognized as the nation's

high individual on stage at convention for the Agricultural Sales CDE; and Colfax's Ag Sales team represented the community at the highest level on stage placing 3rd in the nation. Colfax FFA also competed in state Soils and Land Evaluation in November, having two teams finish in the top eight and also finishing in the top eight in state at the Potato Evaluation CDE. Additionally, five members of the Colfax FFA chapter were able to place 6th in state for the first time in the Apple Evaluation CDE.

As we head into spring, members are currently writing speeches and learning the process to facilitate an agricultural sale with a customer. If you follow Colfax FFA, then you've seen how the Ag Sales CDE has positively impacted our small chapter over the last five years. The greenhouse currently has over 1500 plants that the plant science class has been potting and tending to in preparation for our annual plant sale.

I will again take the opportunity to thank the community for supporting our young FFA members. Our students' success wouldn't occur without the support and assistance of those who help our agriculture students and FFA members throughout their high school experience.

Riley Hennigar



Our other big project is setting up our new concessions trailer. We were fortunate enough to receive a \$40,000 grant from the Washington State FFA Foundation for the purchase



We are also working at integrating the concessions trailer into the curriculum so that the students get more hands on opportunity to learn business and technical skills.

Younger students such as junior high school students don't know what options are out there so they should just join these classes and see what we are doing and what types of experiences they can have by being FFA members.




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
